Dear Parents/Carers,

Nursery

Year 5

This term Year 5 have been studying space. We have been learning all about the Solar System, the planets and the moon and looked at the amazing photos taken by the Hubble Telescope. We looked at the work of textile artist Karen Rose and have been inspired to create our own space-themed textile art.



We also had a lot of fun during our science experiment where we made our mini rockets fly high into the sky. We did this by putting a vitamin B tablet and some warm water into our miniature rockets. We tightened the lid, gave them a good shake and counted down until blast off. We learnt all about how the vitamin tablet releases a gas as it dissolves which causes pressure in the container causing it to 'blast off' high into the sky.







Year 6





In Year 6, this half term our topic focus was Antarctic exploration. As part of this we looked at the history and geography of the Polar regions. A fabulous spectacle that particularly caught our attention were the Northern lights. Inspired by the beauty of this natural light display in the sky, we decided to create our own art using Brusho an incredibly vibrant, water-based powder paint. It did get quite messy at times, but it was a lot of fun to work with!

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Anti-bullying Week

The children were reintroduced to what bullying is and we looked at different scenario cards and how to deal with the different types of bullying. The children role played a scenario in front of the class and discussed what was happening.



All children were given a human cut out which they decorated and then wrote their personal qualities

on the back - for example 'sporty', 'friendly'.

The children discussed how we all look different and we all like different things and that that is okay. As a class, the children explored differences – for example, hair colour; what we like to do at home; favourite colour etc. Then we were all very happy to make biscuits and choose whether we wanted raisins or chocolate chips.

We introduced the idea of teamwork. What is teamwork? What does it mean to work as a team? In this lesson the children had to work as a team so that no-one was left behind!





The children looked at the difference between being unkind and bullying. We discussed different scenarios on cards and decided which category each one fell into – 'unkind' or 'bullying'.





Presents

We have been fund raising and have worked with different community organizations to give many of our children a Kind Christmas Gift. The children and families have been delighted with the lovely gifts, and we hope this will go some way to helping families during this difficult time.



Attendance

It has been a challenging term for attendance, due to some children having to self-isolate. However with the determination of the children and the continued support of parents we have persevered, and attendance is currently averaging the same as national. Well done and keep sending your children to school, every day.

Please do ensure that your child comes to school every day, however, if they are not well enough to be in school please leave a clear message on the absence line to let school know what is wrong with your child; for example, headache, tummy ache, vomiting. It is very difficult if a message is left just saying, "not feeling well today or a bit of a temperature". In such cases, we will call parents back to find out what exactly the illness/temperature is and what symptoms they have, and whether parents should book to have a test.

If you suspect your child is developing coronavirus symptoms, please do <u>not</u> send them to school but ring the NHS Covid line 119 for advice and keep school informed. It is very quick and easy to get a test and the results are coming back within 24hrs enabling your child to get back to school safely as soon as possible if they receive a negative result.

Remember that children who attend school regularly and have at least 95+ attendance make fantastic progress and really develop their learning.

On a very positive note, we have **187 children** who have achieved **100% attendance** and they will receive a fabulous certificate and a reward. Let's see if we can increase this number for the Spring term!
