Dear Parents/Carers,

As we finish another successful year at Mount Pleasant, I have so many exciting items to share with you. Firstly, I am excited and very pleased to tell you that we have achieved some of our best ever Year 6 SATs results, surpassing national averages.

These results are something the whole Mount Pleasant community should be very, very proud of. This year, we have achieved well above the national average for Reading, Writing, Maths, as well as the combined measure for all three subjects.

To provide further context, when our children first start Nursery, only 4% meet the national expectations. The results above clearly indicate the HUGE amount of progress our children make at Mount Pleasant Primary School. As such we are extremely proud of the achievements that the school has made, and we look forward to continuing achieving brilliant results every year.

As well as the KS2 SATs results, Year 1 have smashed the phonics screening with **94**% passing the test! This is truly wonderful, and we know we will be much, much higher than the national averages. Phonics is so important in ensuring solid foundations for great readers – well done to everyone.



In addition to these amazing results, I hope you have seen our new school song and video, 'Aspirations: Be The Artist of Your Life.' We wanted to showcase our school motto of Think Big, Aim High and Achieve, and how important it is to raise aspirations for all our children. The song and video shares key messages that if you work hard and believe in yourself, anything is possible. It really did give the children the chance to broaden their horizons and demonstrated our commitment to encourage them to 'Think Big, Aim High and Achieve'.

Year 6




Professor Emeritus Anne Gregory from the University of Huddersfield told Year 6 about the work of the World Health Organisation in health emergencies such as epidemics, natural disasters and war. The children realised how difficult it was to communicate in situations with no internet and with language issues and they asked important and intelligent questions. They made outstanding posters of how to communicate difficult messages such as 'only drink bottled water' without using words! session was thought provoking and really made the children think.

'Think Forensic' company set up a crime scene in our small hall and the children learnt all about the forensic evidence that can be left behind after a crime.

They were fascinated to learn about the work of a CSI team and how they gather the evidence. (Crime Scene Investigators).





Staff from the Transpennine Alliance engaged the children with a presentation about the Transpennine Route Upgrade project and the work taking place.

The children then got to work with some colour coding robots called Ozobots. They worked in small groups to learn how to code using coloured marker pens.

Year 5



Dentist, Dr Nisar gave a brilliant presentation to the Year 5 pupils and explained the various jobs related to dentistry. He showed lots of images and videos that the children loved and they had an engaging afternoon understanding the difference a dentist can make to people's lives.



Greenhead College Psychology teacher Mrs Wike gave a presentation explaining what psychology is. The children enjoyed learning about the different fields Ωf psychology.



The Fresh Futures charity staff came into school to talk to the children about the various job opportunities within the area of charity work.

They asked our children what subjects they enjoyed and what they would be interested in doing when they were older. They explained how those skills and interests could be reflected in charity working.

This year it is the charity's 50th birthday and they asked children to design a poster to celebrate.

<u>Year 4</u>

Engineers from Suez Recycling company came into school to tell Year 4 all about recycling in Kirklees and about producing energy from waste. The children loved it when they emptied black and green bins out onto the classroom floor for them to sort back into the correct coloured bin. (the waste was clean!) They also brought in a model toy turbine for the children to take a look at and have a go with and explained how the turbines were used in energy production.







Andy Booth, along with other staff from Huddersfield Town Football Club came along to describe the wide variety of jobs involved with the running of a football club. They included jobs such as a videographer, referee, commentator, line guard, ballboy, ticket office, first aider, store assistant, sponsorship department, grass maintenance, chef and kitchen staff.

The football enthusiasts in the class were pleased when their teacher suggested a short video of Andy's goals!

GP, Dr Azam brought along his doctor's bag and the children in Year 4 were fascinated to learn all about the different pieces of equipment, their technical names and what they were used for. They even got to try them out themselves.

Many of the children said they wanted to be doctors when they grow up.

Year 3

One of the Project Sports trainers came into school to engage the Year 3 children in

sporting activities, including a tug of war and archery.







The children had a fantastic session with him and learnt a lot about team work and various sports they could become involved in.



Lawrence Batley Theatre staff came to talk to the children about the theatre and the different job opportunities within that kind of setting, for example front of house staff, the performers, the stage staff, lighting staff etc.

The children were also able to take part in some fun interactive drama, dance and singing.



Kirklees recycling officers came into school to talk to Year 3 about the jobs in recycling.

They brought ipads with a very interesting recycling game that the children loved. They learnt lots of new things.



Year 2



A group of staff from Switalskis Solicitors came to talk to Year 2 children about the law and what it is. After a brief introduction the children enjoyed a little quiz on real or fake laws.

They then took part in a mock trial – 'The trial of Goldilocks' and saw the *evidence* of the spoon and the bowl!

A volunteer from the Yorkshire Air Ambulance team came into school and gave a presentation about the work they do and the different job roles.

Veterinary Surgeon, Zak, came from Donaldson's vets to talk to the children about a vet's job. He showed them a brilliant presentation and they learnt a lot about the different equipment a vet uses. 




Nursery Memorable Experience

Year 4 Memorable Experience

Year 4 children were visited by two acoustic engineers from MZA Acoustics. They began by scientifically explaining how sound is created. They then demonstrated how vibrations as well as echoes of sound can be seen using a slinky.

Thereafter, the children were quizzed around the measurement of sound. Specific sounds were created within the room to be measured by a special programme.


Finally, the visitors shared interesting facts on how Mount Pleasant Primary School underwent specific sound checks to ensure the building was soundproof.





The engineers also explained how the design of the classroom contributes to a perfect acoustic learning environment because of the way sound is projected from the front to the back of the classroom.

Linking in with their Geography unit (Fieldwork and Map Skills), Year 5 visited Beaumont Park to carry out an orienteering exercise. Whilst exploring this unique, spectacular, Victorian park, the pupils had to locate letters, using their map and compass to help them, and record the corresponding number. They could use the control description to check where they needed to search in order to find the letter. Once they had all the numbers recorded, they totalled them up to see if it matched the answer to that given on the map.

Carry My Story Celebration Ceremony



On Thursday 27th July class 2B took part in their final chapter of the project. After plenty of researching, resourcing and rehearsals we set off on the school minibuses to present Ryad's story to other Kirklees schools.

Throughout the day the other schools performed their stories for us. They had many strong themes such as hope, belief, bravery, kindness and

We found out that not all heroes wear capes and we can all be heroes in many ways. We explored the other school's tabletop presentation, where we saw how many different people can live together and have so many different experiences in life and how with the right support and help, we can bloom, blossom and became great again.

This was the similar theme to our presentation; Ryad had told us, "Without the bees there would be no nature, no life and no world." Therefore, we took on the challenge to explain to the other schools how bees are endangered, how we can support the bees and make a difference to our world. The children made posters and spoke about their ideas and feelings to a variety of children and adults from Kirklees.





After dinner it was our turn to perform Ryad's story, how he was a well-loved educator of people and bees in his hometown in Syria until the civil war broke out. This made him lose everything and he made the decision to flee with his family and move to England, where, with the right support, he is now putting all his knowledge and passion into Bee Keeping and has set up a very successful business in Marsden.

We are so proud of our amazing children in 2B, they spoke loudly, performed with confidence and represented Ryad's powerful story in their own way. They called this story, 'The Boy That Lost His BUMBLE.'

Phone lines open at 8.00 am. We have a duty under safeguarding to ensure that there is a reason for children being absent.
