## Happy Halloween



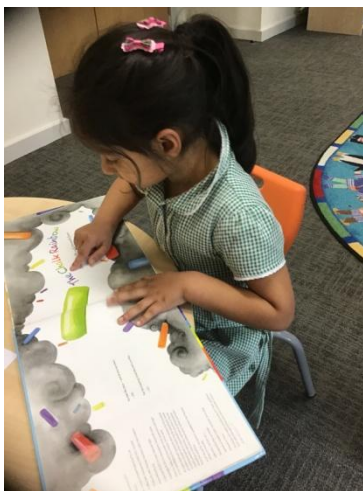
Dear Parents/Carers,

Firstly, can I start by thanking all our families for making a great effort in attending parents' evening last week and meeting the class teachers. It was wonderful to hear all your positive comments on how the staff and school are helping your children make such great progress. It is important to us that our parents are happy with our school, as we are all working hard together to make a massive difference to all our children's learning.

After the fantastic Key Stage 2 results in July 2019, where we met and exceeded national expectations, and just as importantly with our children making above national for progress, we are now working hard to ensure that we continue with our amazing results. We have set ambitious targets for all children, with appropriate interventions so that children can meet these expectations. Parents are always asking what they can do to support their children at home. We have invested in two online resources; Oxford Reading Buddy and Times Tables Rockstars. Every child has their own log on details and can access these resources for free at home. Please make sure that your child does read every day at home, they can read their reading book, library book or go online on Oxford Reading Buddy. Children should also practise their times tables. For the first time this year, children in Year 4 will be tested on their times table fluency for up to their 12x table.

Looking forward to the next half term, this will be very busy with many planned visits, memorable experiences, visit to the Lawrence Batley Theatre as well as our usual assemblies and lessons celebrating different festivals and events, such as Remembrance Day.

Reading is always going to be a high priority in our school and we are always looking into new ways on how we can engage children so that they develop a love for life-long reading. In September, we launched Oxford Reading Buddy in school. All children from nursery to Year 6 have been issued with logins and they are able to use the site at home to access hundreds of books and practise their reading skills. Workshops have been held in school for parents where further information was shared and demonstrations given on how to use the site with their children at home. Most children are reading books and

## Memorable Experiences

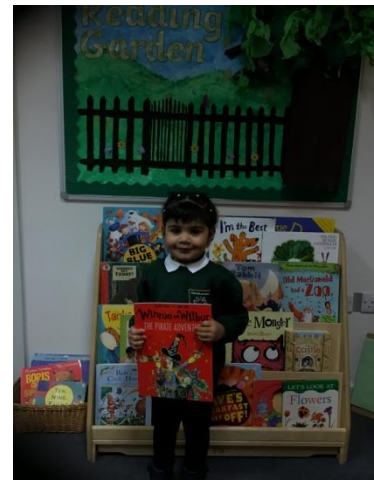
### Nursery & Reception

## Year 5



Year 5 pupils travelled back in time 5000 years to the dusty realms of ancient Egypt. They cruised along the Nile, entering a world of mystery and curses, mummies and kings. The children were mesmerised when they witnessed the process of mummification (embalming). They looked at photos of and explored the contents of the tomb of Tutankhamun and created a timeline to show how ancient Egyptian civilisation developed.



They learnt about Egyptian headwear and the role of an Egyptian pharaoh; and even learnt how to write like an Egyptian scribe!

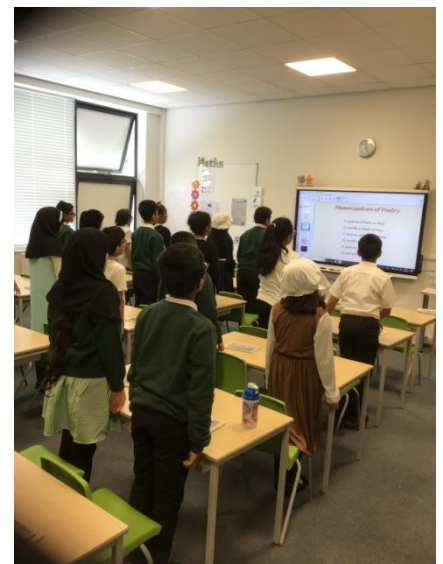
## Year 6

For their memorable experience this half term Year 6 pupils have learnt about the Victorian Era and how times were very different for the rich and the poor children. They learnt how hard life was for the poor; children working long hours; life in the workhouse, and crime and the severe punishments. They learnt about the impact of the Industrial Revolution and about the Great Exhibition held in Hyde Park's Crystal Palace. They enjoyed dressing up in Victorian clothes.

We asked the children to dress up as Victorian children. They experienced a day of Victorian schooling. They had to learn their times tables, have dictation lessons and practice their joined up handwriting. It was a very long morning! However, in the afternoon, children were able to design, make and evaluate Victorian toys such as Peg Dolls and Thaumatrope. It was so much more fun in the afternoon without the strict Victorian rules.



Teachers carried canes; children used 'slates' instead of paper; fingernails were checked for cleanliness, and all had to stand up very straight and recite what was on the board! A typical Victorian school day.



## Sport

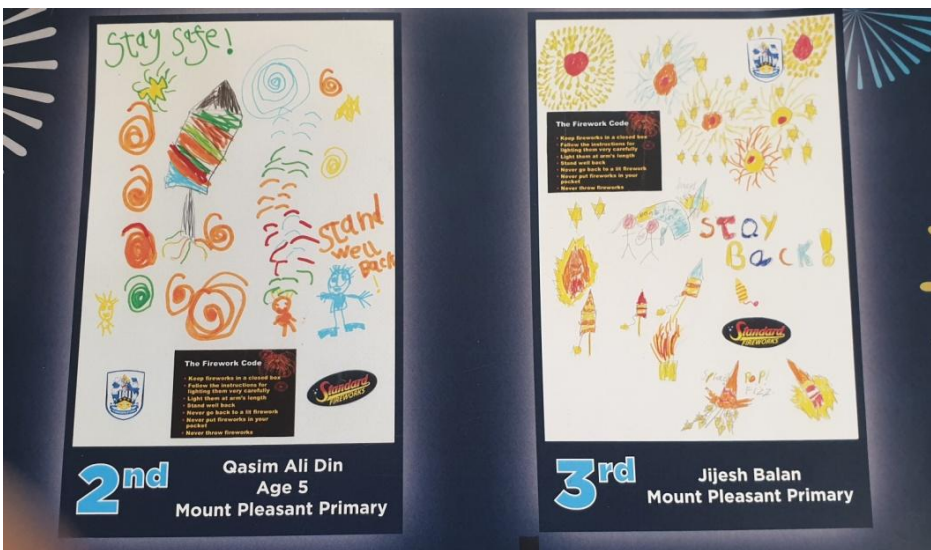

## Times Tables Rock Stars



At Mount Pleasant Primary School we want all of our pupils to have great recall of the times tables and high confidence in mathematics. Children in Year 2 to Year 6 now have access to Times Table Rockstars to help them practise their times tables. Times Table Rockstars is an online programme for times table practise that is both effective and motivational. Your child will have a login and password that will allow them to access games to improve their speed of recall and, should they wish, to compete against their classmates and children around the world.

When it comes to times tables, speed AND accuracy are important – bursts of daily practise are more effective than spending hours once a week; and this is where you come in. For your child to be fully motivated and for them to get the best out of the practise, they need your help. Without your praise and your reminders, without you sitting down next to them or checking their work, practising times tables will not feel important to your child, and the more facts your child remembers, the easier it will be for them to apply them to other areas of mathematics. Please encourage your child to play the game at home regularly. Each half term, one child from each class will be awarded with a prize and certificate for making the most progress which will be celebrated in 'Special Assemblies'.

Times Tables Rockstars can be easily accessed with internet browsers or alternatively with phones and tablets using the Times Table Rockstar app. For internet browsers, visit <https://trockstars.com/> for apps, visit the App/Play Store.

Please note: if your child has lost their username and login, please see the class teacher who can reset it.

### The Welcome Centre



The Welcome Centre in Huddersfield helps local families and individuals in crisis with food, toiletries and other essential items. They also provide guidance and support for those in need.

- If you already receive support from a service or professional, you can ask them to make a referral for you. This could be your GP, social worker, community psychiatric nurse or an agency such as housing services, Lifeline or Connexions.
- You can telephone Kirklees Local Welfare Provision Team (LWP) on 01484 414782. If you don't have a phone to call LWP, there's a free phone at the Customer Services reception, Civic Centre III, High Street, Huddersfield.
- You can call in at Kirklees Citizens Advice & Law Centre (1 & 3 Brook Street, Huddersfield, HD1 1EB) between 9:30am and 3pm Monday to Friday, or at the Huddersfield Mission Cafe (3-13 Lord Street, Huddersfield HD1 1QA) between 10:00am and 1:30pm Monday to Friday. Both of these organisations have advice workers who can make a referral for you.

## KIRKLEES SHARED LIVES IN NEED OF SHORT BREAK CARERS



Kirklees Council is currently looking to recruit more Shared Lives carers to offer Short Breaks (up to 28 days a year) in order to help vulnerable adults and their full time carers within our communities.

Shared Lives is a scheme run by Kirklees Council – It is much like fostering but Shared Lives carers support adults with additional needs – it could be a learning disability, early on set dementia, after hospital care, mental health issues or a physical disability. The scheme recruits, trains and supports carers who are then carefully matched to a service user or users. Short breaks carers receive £75 per night when caring for a service user.

All short break carers would receive comprehensive training and would be DBS cleared.

### Attendance

All our parents and families are aware that attendance and punctuality is very important to us, so you can imagine our disappointment at the overall percentage for last year when it was confirmed as 94%. This is the lowest it has been for a number of years and is lower than the overall national figure. OFSTED are really keen on attendance and punctuality, it is a key factor that they monitor when visiting schools.

After analysing our statistics, illness is one of the main reasons for low attendance with leave of absence following closely behind. With this in mind please see the table below; we have a total of 874 authorised absences since returning in September and 299 unauthorised absences. Please always be mindful before allowing your child to have that “odd” day off school if he/she is just “not feeling up to it”. It could make a huge difference to our attendance figures making our school even more brilliant! Once your child is in school they forget they didn't want to come and have a fantastic day of learning. Remember, we will always call parents to collect their child if they are really “not well enough to be in school”.

Please also bear in mind that when you are thinking about taking extended leave during term time, If you really need to go, come and speak to the Headteacher, try to minimise the number of days you request, for example 5 days, by attaching them to a holiday. We believe your child's education is more important than going abroad in term time.

On the plus side we have got off to a fabulous start this term and our overall percentage is averaging at 97%. We have so many children that come to school every day hitting 100% attendance every week, we are very proud of them and their achievements will be celebrated at the end of term.
